Renovations, sustainable building materials can boost Europe's green transition

The EEA report 'Addressing the environmental and climate footprint of buildings' assesses the current state of Europe's buildings stock and looks at what is needed to make Europe's buildings more sustainable. Renovating existing buildings with sustainable materials while improving climate resilience and working with nature are key. The report also explores what policy actions are needed to achieve that by 2050. More than 30% of the EU's environmental footprint comes from buildings, making it the sector with the highest environmental impact. About one third of the Union's material consumption goes to construction. The use of buildings accounts for 42% of the total energy consumption and 35% of greenhouse gas emissions. Promoting a culture of sustainability

Waste management leader EnviroServ reaffirmed its commitment to sustainability and community responsibility with an employee clean-up initiative during September's Environmental Awareness Month. Employees across South Africa, Mozambique and Uganda dedicated an hour of their time to cleaning the streets surrounding their operations. Customers and local food vendors were inspired by the team's commitment, showing community spirit by picking up their brooms to join the clean-up effort and demonstrating a collective dedication to a cleaner environment. This was the company's second employee clean-up event following December's activation for International Volunteer Day, where the team logged an impressive 759 volunteer hours, achieving 36% of its stated sustainability goal.
